Maria is the youngest of five, a pet lover, and hopes to become a surgeon one day; she is currently learning to drive



#### From Homeless to Home: Catalina's Journey

Catalina came to Alternatives For Girls in 2018. She was trafficked for four years and brought to Michigan from Minnesota by her trafficker. She soon found herself experiencing homelessness and struggled to find her way. Catalina was introduced to AFG by another organization that works with sex trafficking survivors. While at AFG, Catalina has accomplished so much through the New Choices program.

After being involved with AFG for over a year, the Outreach and Education (OES) department offered Catalina a paid position as a Peer Leader. AFG offers its participants who have engaged with the program for at least a year and who have displayed leadership skills the opportunity to become Peer Leaders. Catalina gladly accepted the opportunity to reach out to other atrisk young women within the community!

Throughout her time at AFG, she has earned her GED and has started college this year at Oakland Community College. Through generous donors like you, Catalina obtained a much-needed laptop to assist her with her education. Thank you!

### Letter from CEO

September 15th marked Alternatives For Girls 33rd anniversary.

On the one hand, what happened 33 years ago this fall did not seem all that dramatic: it is the anniversary of our incorporation, which we learned about a week later when we received the paperwork in the mail. That is, on September 15th, 1987, someone in a state office stamped "approved," with the date, on our application for incorporation as a Michigan nonprofit.

On the other hand, it was more momentous than any of us could have imagined at the time.

There were many events during AFG's early days that were significant:

- The community meeting in June 1987, during which southwest Detroit stakeholders determined that leaving girls and young women in our community "out in the cold" with no access to shelter, support specific to girls and their families, or services for those engaged in sex work, facing gang involvement, or dropping out of school, was intolerable, and during which the community pledged to take action.
- The launching of our prevention services, delivered by neighborhood volunteers, that fall.
- The submission of our first significant grant proposal in November of 1987 to HUD, seeking funding to open a shelter—denied the following month.
- The opening of our shelter in January 1988, despite the lack of funding, in response to an urgent need for which there was no alternative, and our commitment to sustain the shelter for as long as we could, solely, based on volunteers.
- The phone call on a wonderful day in April 1988, letting us know that we were receiving HUD funding, after all, effective July 1st.
- Our first street outreach shift on Christmas Eve, 1988.

We choose the date of our incorporation as our official anniversary because it was our quiet but yet deafeningly loud claim that we were here for the long haul, that we had legitimacy, and big plans. We declared our mission and put our stake in the ground: all girls and women deserve safety, support, and access to opportunities and fabulous choices.

Since then, our excellent staff members, volunteers, donors, and supporters of all kinds have put their heart and soul into making sure that AFG's mission is fulfilled every hour of every day. It is awe-inspiring to consider how many lives we've impacted, together, over the years, and the lives that have been affected by their lives, and on and on!!

September also marks the end of AFG's fiscal year, an unprecedented one, but one in which there is much to celebrate. The coronavirus dramatically exacerbated already precarious circumstances for those we serve, but did not thwart our mission. We kept our crisis services up and running, safely and in-person, including our shelter, transition to independent living program, subsidized housing, and crisis resource center. Our creative staff scrambled to provide life-saving food, supplies, and PPE to our participants and their families throughout the community and equipment to ensure that girls could connect to the internet and remain engaged with school and with AFG's activities.



With the tremendous help of hundreds of friends—individuals, corporations, government entities, churches, and foundations—we were able to meet the formidable expenses of fighting the pandemic on all fronts, from intense cleaning of our building, to transforming meeting rooms into additional bedrooms, to providing the well-deserved "hazard pay" to our courageous front-line staff. We engaged with participants in all of our programs through a combination of virtual and (safe) in-person services and care. The coronavirus brought horrors in the lives of those we serve, leading to severe illness and, tragically, deaths of family members. However, our year-end results reflect the positive impact of the efforts and grit of our teams and the girls and women we serve:

- All ten of the high school seniors in our programs graduated! Nine are in college now; one is headed to college in January.
- Fifty-two girls participated in our summer "Rise 'N Shine" program, in which they were able to virtually "visit" places such as the STEM Center of Excellence in northeast Texas, the Birthplace of Music in Mississippi, the Nature Conservancy, southeast Asia, a Virtual Escape Room, and Barro Colorado Isle in Panama!
- An additional 47 teen girls were hired this summer as Youth Leaders and completed their virtual leadership training, funded by the Grow Detroit's Young Talent program.
- Our outreach team served 2,190 girls and women through our street-based outreach, peer education program, domestic violence project, crisis resource center, and social enterprise.
- We helped 19 victims/survivors of domestic violence to navigate the domestic violence court process.
- Participants in our "Sew Great Detroit" social enterprise sewed and donated hundreds of face
  masks, and are currently creating beautiful hand-stitched greeting cards for sale in time for the
  holidays.
- We served 124 girls and young women experiencing homelessness, and 34 of their young children in our housing programs.
- 90% (46/51) of those in our transition to independent living program were employed, in school, or both, despite the extraordinary employment challenges of the pandemic.
- 95% remained stably housed six months after exiting AFG's residential programs.

With your help, we will continue to stay strong, in the season of this pandemic and beyond, and to promote access to positive choices for those we serve. Here's to many more years of AFG continuing to make a difference, together with all of our friends.
